

FROM THE PASTOR

I was talking to a colorful bird the other day. Said his name was Henry, named after his Great Granddaddy. He was singing boldly, joyfully. I asked him how come he sings so much. Said he was free. "Free from what," I asked him. He said, "Oh you know. All the stuff people said he was supposed to be and could have been. Were it not for him being born with wings and such skinny legs, as well as no real arms and hands, he could have been a beauty!"

We talked on about the expectations people place upon themselves, and similarly place on other people, other creatures. All because someone else suggested they should be such and such. It seems to make people crazy some-times, or just plain dumb.

Henry said he was given a faith that expected so much of him. It sounded good, just and right. How did he know to question any of it? He swallowed it like he did the food given to him. He thought about trimming his feathers in the shape of hands. But he didn't have the hands to do such a thing, so they grew just as they were. People tried to teach him to talk. "Polly want a cracker?" they kept saying to him. Then they would poke food at him as if everything was about food and some kind of instant gratification – a reward for every good behavior, of which talking was a priority. He sang to them, but he never got a cracker for singing. He found himself imprisoned by those demands to perform as requested.

Until one day, he doesn't know how, but he got free. His unclipped feathers came in handy and his little skinny short legs were perfect for flying and then holding on to things when he didn't want to fly. They weren't a handicap as some would have thought. His legs and his wings turned out to be uniquely fitting parts of his body. "Who said you had to have long, toned pretty legs to be attractive?"

So, he said he sings because he's free. Free of the silly things he heard at times about how he looked, and what he'd never do. He just sings and sings now. Oh, and he flies. Miss the crackers? They were nothing compared to what he found in the trees, among the grasses. And in some of the nicest people's feeders.

Free. Why would he ever go back to being restrained by such foolish thoughts? Or demanding expectations? Or hideous comparisons to other creatures? Once you get free you've got to fly and sing. And you know it's for what you were made.

We are not called to live easy lives; we are called to faithful living. That faithful living includes not only being a part of a Faith Community and being actively involved in the life of FBCE but also recognizing that we all belong first to God, that all we have and all we are is God's to begin with. Faithful living includes giving thanks to God at the end of a busy day for the places where you saw his grace shining through. Jesus reminds us in this passage from Matthew that there will be work to do but you do not need to be overwhelmed by it because Jesus is with us every step of the way and as much as we desire to lead lives of faith for Jesus, Jesus will always be faithful to us.



It is a joy and blessing to serve our Lord with you! *John Cotten*




