FROM THE PASTOR

Our turning of the calendar carries us into a new season of the church year – Epiphany. One of the central scripture readings of Epiphany is the baptism of Jesus. Reflecting on that moment, author Christine Chakoian writes, “Sometimes it’s hard for us to remember who we are.”

We know something about that, don’t we? Many of us have been to family reunions or class reunions with a low-grade anxiety humming beneath the surface. Will I remember who people are? Will they remember me? And perhaps most unsettling of all—will I recognize myself?

Unbelievably, I am approaching my fiftieth high school reunion, and I’m not handling it well. At first, I was excited. Then I saw some classmates on Facebook, a few in person. I saw pictures, of them, and of myself. We look somewhat like the people we remember being... and yet not. So the reunion – Will it be joyful, full of dreams lived and still unfolding? Will it be painful, marked by the ways life has been unkind? God forbid someone should say to me, “You’re the same old son of a gun you were back when.” The thought that I might have squandered the last fifty years with so little transformation is deeply unsettling.

The question of who we are — really are — is central to the meaning of our lives. And it sits right at the heart of Epiphany.

Chakoian points out that Jesus’ baptism is an announcement to everyone about who Jesus is: “This is my Son, the Beloved, with whom I am well pleased.” Yet this moment is more than a public proclamation. Jesus’ baptism is also a clarification as well as an invitation to Jesus himself to remember who he is.

The Gospel writers were certain it was crucial that “Jesus’ identity is announced publicly, but just as essential that Jesus himself lay claim to his identity — that he take up his calling. ... It will not be easy. ... And through it all, he will remember who he is.”

I have long thought of Jesus’ baptism as a hallmark moment for Jesus. And if that is true for Jesus’ baptism, then the same should be true of our baptism. Our baptism speaks volumes to us about who we are, who we will always be, and into whom we are continually becoming.

What encouraging, bright news about who we are: ***God’s beloved, in whom God is well pleased.***

It has been a long time since I last saw it, but Chakoian uses a film to lead us to an epiphanic moment. “In *The Lion King*, Rafiki asks Simba, “Who are you?” It is a pivotal moment, confronting Simba’s refusal to claim his true identity as the rightful heir to the Pride Lands. Later, Simba finally understands when his late father, Mufasa, speaks from the sky: “Remember who you are. ... You are my son and the one true king.” Only then is Simba able to come to terms with his past, claim his identity, and take up his responsibility to restore what has been broken.”

So as we turn the calendar to Epiphany ...

“A CHARGE TO KEEP I HAVE”

This Sunday we will witness something both ancient and immediate: the laying on of hands, the prayers of consecration, and the solemn vows that mark the ordination of our deacons. As your minister of music, I've been pondering what it means to accompany such a moment musically.

There's a verse in Colossians that speaks of teaching and admonishing one another in psalms, hymns, and spiritual songs, singing with gratitude in our hearts to God. Music in the life of the church has never been mere performance or entertainment—it's how we remember, how we pray, how we bear witness to what God is doing among us.

When we ordain deacons, we're recognizing God's hand already at work in their lives. We're saying as a community: we see Christ in you, and we need the gifts you bring. Charles Wesley captured this sense of divine appointment beautifully in “A Charge to Keep I Have.” The hymn speaks directly to the weight and wonder of being entrusted with a specific calling: “A charge to keep I have, a God to glorify, a never-dying soul to save, and fit it for the sky.”

Every deacon accepts such a charge—not as burden but as sacred trust. Wesley's second verse reminds us that this work requires vigilance: “To serve the present age, my calling to fulfill.” Our deacons are called to this present moment, to these particular people, to the needs that exist right here in our community. The hymn doesn't promise ease but purpose, asking God for strength to guard against temptation and to watch and pray through faithful service.

I'm mindful that some of our most powerful moments of worship happen when the music steps back and makes room for silence, for reflection, for the still small voice. Sunday's service will include both—songs of celebration and quiet moments where we can hear our own hearts responding to God's call in our lives, whether we're being ordained or simply reaffirming our commitment to follow Christ wherever He leads.

Come expectant. Come ready to worship.
