I haven't thought about it in this way, as an act of resistance. But we do it all the time. "Giving, as an act of resistance," says Rev. Satterlee. It may sound like a rather negative motivation, but it really is an act of courage, of brave defiance.

The truth is we do it all the time. In defiance of the rudeness that runs wild sometimes, we make a concerted effort to be kind. To the waitress at our table, we smile and speak politely in the face of her demanding requests from so many customers. We proactively leave a kind tip. In the face of what looks like a boring job, on their feet all day, scanning items one after another, never a break in the line, we make an effort to be gracious to the grocery clerk. As others pass by the pan-handler we find a dollar or even a five and offer it, along with a smile as we go by. When hurt and feeling justified in our actions, we resist lashing out and respond to our friend or family member with love. Though rushed by our fast-paced lives, we resist and hold the door for the next person coming through. Even on the road, where courtesy seems almost nonexistent, we stop to hold back the line of traffic to let someone pull out in front of us.

And on and on it can go. With our acts of resistance, we make the effort to be faithful, Christ like people. Among those acts of resistance we give, even tithe, as a part of our life. We understand the draw of affluence. We hear the call of the ancient language from scripture about the power of mammon. We listen to the call to resist the powers of self-ishness with the simple act of giving freely, regularly, to God's church. We take time to calculate the cost of our barns as Jesus told in that story of the man who failed to resist.

He succumbed to the powers of mammon. Found himself investing his life in ways that were meaningless in the end.

So, while I haven't thought of it in this way for a while, I think how significant that we give as an act of resistance. I wonder if such giving isn't a strong part of

the wisdom of James, "resist the devil and he will flee from you." Giving is a gracious, even healing act. It not only shares necessary resources, but also redeems us from the mammon. Mammon would overwhelm us if left to roam free among us.

I'm grateful for the gift of giving and the privilege of being able to give. What joy!

CHILDREN & YOUTH NEWS

I have been serving for 11 years on staff at different churches, and I still need to be reminded why youth ministry is important. I need to be reminded because the truth is that student ministry can be difficult. Many times, it's just easier to let teens do what they want and think they don't desire or need adults in their lives. It may be easy to ignore them, but the truth is that they are desperate for adults to actually show up and invest in their life on a consistent basis.

I believe teens & youth need someone from the Faith Community who will invest in them, show up, support them, and listen to and love them. I know from personal experience how beneficial a supportive and encouraging Youth Pastor can be. We live in a difficult and challenging world. I think that Youth Ministry today is more different and challenging than it's ever been.

Look at these recent statistics from Fuller Youth Institute:

- 1/3 Youth struggle with mental health.
- 61% of Youth say that the adults in their life don't know that they struggle with mental health (anxiety, depression, suicidal thoughts).
- 37% of Youth say they are not acknowledged or called by name when they attend Church or Faith based groups.
- 1/5 Students don't receive any welcome when they show up to an event.

This is heart breaking and unacceptable. Why do I enjoy and want to work with students? Because students need to know that they belong. They need to know that they matter, and are cared for and appreciated. They need to know that we love them, and so does Christ.

Here are three things you can do to support our Students and the Youth Ministry here at First Baptist Church:

- 1) **PRAY.** Pray for our students, our staff and volunteers. That through the help of the Holy Spirit we might connect with students and help them to know or grow in Christ.
- 2) **VOLUNTEER.** We have a place for everyone! We are always in need of volunteers. If you feel led to be a part of what God is doing here, get involved.
- 3) **SHOW UP.** The hardest part of Youth Ministry is feeling like we are fighting against everything else students and families are doing. There are 168 hours in a week. We meet for just 1.5 hours each week.



through psalms, hymns, and songs from the Spirit, singing to God with gratitude in your hearts." (Colossians 3:16)



Yes, we are busy rehearsing for our 15th Annual "Christmas on the Avenue," slated for Sunday, December 3, and yes, our Saturdays are precious. But I'm reminded of what God tells us in Psalm 133, "How wonderful and pleasant it is when brothers and sisters live together in harmony! For harmony is as precious as anointing oil..." This is a unique opportunity for singers of our community to literally live in harmony!


