"PENTECOSTAL POWER"

As we approach the season of Pentecost, I've been drawn to one of our beloved hymns that captures the transformative spirit of that first Pentecost morning. "Pentecostal Power" reminds us of the dynamic work of the Holy Spirit in our lives and in our worship together.

This hymn, written in the late 19th century during the height of the revival movement, speaks to the hunger many believers feel for a deeper spiritual experience. The text calls us to seek the same power that filled the disciples in the upper room - not as a one-time historical event, but as a present reality available to us today.

What strikes me most about this hymn is how it connects our personal spiritual journey with our corporate worship. When we sing these verses together, we're not just recalling an ancient story; we're inviting the Holy Spirit to move among us with fresh power and purpose. The melody itself seems to build with anticipation, much like the disciples waiting in Jerusalem.

In our worship service Sunday, I encourage you to listen carefully to the words we're singing. Notice how the hymn progresses from recognition of our need to confident expectation of God's response. This pattern mirrors our own spiritual growth - from awareness of our dependence on God to bold faith in His promises.

As your minister of music, I see firsthand how the Holy Spirit works through our congregational singing. There's something powerful that happens when voices unite in common petition and praise. "Pentecostal Power" serves as both prayer and proclamation, asking God to fill us while declaring our faith that He will.

I invite you to spend time with this hymn outside of Sunday morning. Read through the verses slowly, perhaps making them your personal prayer. Consider what it means to seek the same spirit that empowered the early church for their mission in the world.

May our music continue to be a gateway for encountering the living God, and may we sing with hearts open to the transforming power of His Spirit. Blessings,



But he still lives on my book shelves. And one of my favorite places to visit with him is in a collection of prayers he titled *A Book of Uncommon Prayers*. Go with me to a prayer for opossums.
