FROM THE PASTOR

It may be known to a few as the parable of the wheat and the tares. In recent decades it has come to be known as the parable of weeds among the wheat. The word translated tares is now most often translated weeds.

And as with any parable there are many layers to be addressed. I've learned it is hardly advantageous to try to include everything that could be said in a Sunday sermon. My Mother was often enamored by the knowledge some of her ministers possessed, but she did grow weary when it seemed like they wanted to tell it all in one sermon. So, she often counseled me, "Don't tell it all. Save some for next time." I've tried to listen to her counsel.

Part of what might never make it into a sermon about this parable in Matthew 13:24-30 are some thoughts provoked by David Ewart's writing about the parable. After naming several things worthy of note in the parable, he notes that the parable is also about the field. We are akin the field where both wheat and weeds grow. Our hearts, our souls are a field. As we live various things grow within us. As much as we might like to be a field where only the finest wheat is cultivated, the truth is weeds also find their way into our lives. There is often a lot of anxiety about those weeds.

The parable clearly is not filled with such anxiety. The parable actually seeks to absolve one of those weeds and any anxiety associated with the weeds. How? The parable is telling of an eschatological certainty that in the end God will act to clean the fields of the weeds and collect a harvest of wheat. So don't be so anxious about your purity. You can trust God is graciously working toward your redemption. Even among the weeds it will surprise you the wheat God will harvest. Such is the way of God.

David Lose concludes from this parable, "... we don't live in an ideal world and each week we're faced with a myriad of challenging decisions, some small and others large, to which there is no clear answer. Some decisions we'll get right, others wrong, and still others we won't know whether we were right or wrong for months or years to come. But we still need to make them. And then, each week, no matter how we fared, we can come back to church on Sunday morning to be reminded that God loves us anyway and promises that, in the end, God will hold all of our choices and all of our lives together in love."

Held together in love. Imagine that!

endorphins, the "happiness hormone," more than a box of chocolates but without all the calories. It creates oxytocin that reduces the effects of stress. It strengthens cardiac rhythms, reducing the risk of heart disease. It trains stomach muscles and the diaphragm, encouraging the deep, breathing that fosters better sleep. The immunoglobulin A produced strengthens the immune system. Countless studies have shown that music, especially singing, develops brain function and memory.

Singing in a *church* choir multiplies those benefits exponentially. Scripture sung is scripture remembered. We sing unified prayers repeatedly in both worship and rehearsals. Psalm 22:3 reminds us that *"God inhabits the praises of His people,"* and a church choir praises Him better than most anybody!

Yes, church choirs have weaknesses. Like riding a bicycle, no one is born knowing how to sing, though everyone can learn. Everyone is an amateur, yet a starter. There are no pinch hitters or subs waiting on the bench. Training is available and ongoing. When believers sing together in choir, God weaves the unified sound into something far greater than just the sum of the individual voices.

The most frequently repeated command in all the Bible is to sing, and our church has long believed that a choir was an important part of worship. But the truth is that without new singers, our choir may well evaporate this fall the way choirs have in so many other churches. Let's not let that happen. Come join us as we *Re-Choir!* (*JuBELLation*, our handbell choir, will kick off after Labor Day, and they too are looking for new members.) *John Cotten*
