FROM THE PASTOR

In the Gospel of John it says, "*There was a man sent from God whose name was John.*" As he preaches this text, Will Willimon asks some pertinent questions and makes some pointed observations.

"How did you get here in this church, standing on the threshold of Christmas, the mystery of the incarnation? You are here only because someone "sent from God" told you the truth about Christ. Someone became a witness to you that the babe born in Bethlehem was your good news, the best news you'll ever hear.

Nobody is born Christian. This faith in not innate, natural, part of our genetic inheritance. You cannot think up this faith on your own by having a long walk in the woods, or by sitting quietly at the lakeside. Someone must hand it over to you, tell you the story, attempt to help you see that this ancient story of Jesus is your story here, now. Somebody had to be like John the Baptist—a witness, someone who pointed your gaze toward the Way, the Truth, and the Light.

John's witness was to say to a waiting world, "Look, there, in this Jew from Nazareth named Jesus, there's Mr. Light of the World!"

Maybe your witness was a beloved grandmother who read Bible stories to you. Perhaps your witness was somebody who sat on the side of a bed in a dormitory room in college and argued with you into the night and overcame your doubts. Or maybe your witness was a writer of a book, someone whom you have never met, who said just the right words to you whereby you "saw the light," as we sometimes say. Heck, maybe your witness was some wild-eyed preacher like John the Baptist who said something in a sermon that grabbed you by the neck and demanded to be heard!

You wouldn't be here this Sunday, affirming this faith, expecting the advent of this Messiah if someone had not been your John the Baptist, your witness, your giver of the gift of Good News.

There's something about this God whereby God chooses to make connection with humanity, to speak to us, through ordinary people like John the Baptist. Ordinary folk who are "sent from God" like John to witness to the Light. If someone had not been a witness to you, you'd still be in the dark, so-to-speak.

So here's your Advent/Christmas gospel, good news: There was a person sent from God whose name was Amy (or Tom, or Barry, June, you fill in the name) who "was sent from God." That person was nobody special, an average sort of person who was special in one important way: "sent from God." Why was this one sent, "as a witness to testify concerning the light" so that through their witness, "everyone would believe in the light." The witness "wasn't the light," not even close. But the witness's "mission was to testify concerning the light."

And the Light was the light of all. Through the light shining from the witness, some saw the Light, and the Light shines in the darkness (Jn 1:5), and nothing the darkness has ever been able to do has put out the Light.

Now, go share that good news with somebody who needs to hear it. And don't we all?"

May the good news be shared among us, through us and in us.

I would like to share an unfamiliar Christmas story with you all that I read last week. According to this story, when Joseph was warned in a dream to flee from King Herod and the massacre which he intended to inflict upon the children of Bethlehem, several animals from the manger decided to accompany the Holy Family on their journey. Each of the animals was determined to protect the baby Jesus, and each felt sure his or her talents would prove invaluable in that task. There also happened to be a spider who wanted to come. Yet none of the other animals felt the spider would be helpful. After all, she was only an insect. She had no keen ears or sharp teeth, no strong bones and no claws whatsoever. However, the spider persistently pleaded to be included, until at last the other animals agreed she could join them, provided she did not get in the way. Unfortunately, as the journey unfolded, all the other supposedly brave animals either were frightened off or else were distracted. They ended up returning home or embarking on a more appealing adventure of their own. With Herod's troops on the march, and with the Holy Family growing more and more tired, Joseph and Mary had little choice but to try and hide. Finding a small and inconspicuous cave, they huddled inside, seeking shelter and rest, with the donkey and the spider their only remaining companions. Holding Jesus in her arms, Mary gently rocked him to sleep, and, for a while, it appeared everything would be fine. The only immediate problem was the chill in the air. Seeking to be of help in some small way, the spider carefully wove a web over the opening of the cave to try to keep the baby warm. The spider had just finished her weaving when suddenly voices were heard outside the cave. The soldiers had caught up with the Holy Family, and they were diligently searching the entire area. When they came to the cave where the Holy Family was hidden, both Mary and Joseph held their breath, certain their doom was upon them. Yet the soldiers passed by the cave. One soldier said it was a waste of time to search it, since anyone who had entered the cave would have broken the spider's web over the opening.

And so, it was that the seemingly insignificant spider saved the day; and the legend goes on to say that this is why we hang tinsel on our Christmas trees ... to remind us of the silver strands of the web which the little spider wove ... and to remind us that no act of kindness, no act of courage, no act through which we seek peace with justice is ever wasted.

If our church needed a theme song, that might be a good one! It reflects Jesus' "Great Commission" for His disciples to go into all the world and make more disciples. (Matthew 28:19-20) It reminds us that as we go, we should reflect the Light of the World so clearly that people see Him in us. It encourages us to be bold in sharing our faith in the One who has freed us. As we say in the South, "Brother, that will PREACH!"

Preach? Wait! Isn't that the Preacher's job, not the musicians or anybody else? No, though he is normally the one who delivers what we call a sermon. When Paul tells Timothy in 2 Timothy to preach the Word, he uses the Greek word *keyroxon*, which simply means "publish or proclaim openly." He wasn't just talking about a half-hour speech in a church service. He meant any kind of presentation of God's Word. Our carefully chosen worship music and the words used to help us understand it is another form of "preaching," but that's not all.

Carrying the message far beyond these walls can happen over coffee with friends, or around the dinner table with kids. We can hold forth the Christ light at the grocery store or gas station, the ball field or hospital room. We can proclaim the One who frees us with coworkers and clients, customers and schoolmates. We can even "Speak peace! Reach out in mercy, in kindness and love" in traffic or on social media. Jesus told us to share God's Good News where ever we are in every way we can.

God gave us music and created us to be sensitive to it. Remember learning your ABCs? It was that song! If we're happy and we know it, we know to clap our hands because of another song. Ditto the fact that I once was lost but now am found, was blind but now I see.

What a privilege it is to preach the Word of God with you through His wonderful gift of music! I am humbly thankful to get to lead our church's musical ministry. You are a gracious, generous, thoughtful people. I appreciate the Christmas gifts and loving words of affirmation more than you can know.
